WASHINGTON vs. SYRACUSE Huskies Return To Seattle To Open Home Slate

THE GAME: Washington's 2010 home season kicks off this Saturday when Syracuse travels cross country for a 4:00 p.m. PT game at Husky Stadium. The Huskies and Orange squared off in the first game of the 2007 season. Washington, with RS-freshman quarterback Jake Locker making his debut, won that 2007 game, 42-12. The UW enters the week looking to rebound from a 23-17 loss last Saturday at Brigham Young while the Orange opened their year with a 29-3 victory at Akron. The game will air live on FSN-Northwest and will also be available nationwide on Fox College Sports Atlantic. Of course, it will also air live on KJR and the ISP Sports radio network. The Huskies remain at home the following Saturday, Sept. 18, when Nebraska visits Husky Stadium in a 12:30 p.m. game that will air live on ABC.

AT HOME AFTER ROAD LOSS: Over the last three-plus decades, Washington has strung together a solid record in home games following a road loss, the situation that presents itself this week. Dating back to the last part of the 1975 season, the Huskies have gone 35-14 when playing at home the game after a loss on the road. Included in that stretch are winning streaks of 13 and 10 games in this circumstance. Under Coach Steve Sarkisian, the UW is 2-1 at home the week after a road loss. Last season, the Huskies rebounded for a 37-30 overtime loss at Notre Dame with a 36-33 win over Arizona the following game. Later in the year, after a 48-21 loss at Oregon State, the Dawgs blanked Washington State, 30-0 in the Apple Cup. The one time that the UW lost at home after a road loss last season came in a loss at Arizona State followed at home loss to Oregon the next week.

TELEVISION: The Washington-Syracuse game will air live on FSN-Northwest, with Tom Glasgow, Pro Football Hall of Famer Warren Moon and Jason Stiles providing the commentary. Outside of the Northwest, you can also see the game on Fox College Sports-Atlantic. Additionally, "Huskies All-Access" airs each Wednesday evening on FSN. The program is an up-close look at each Husky game, with features, one-on-one interviews and sideline video.

RADIO: The Washington ISP Sports Network, with its flagship station KJR 950-AM, will carry the live broadcast of every football game on 17 Northwest radio stations. Longtime play-by-play man Bob Rondeau and color analyst Damon Huard are joined by sideline reporter Elise Woodward. The Husky broadcast will also air on Sirius (channel 113) and XM (195) satellite radio, and can be heard over the internet via the Dawg Channel at gohuskies.com.

THE COACH: Steve Sarkisian was introduced as the new head coach of the Washington football team on Dec. 8, 2008. From the start, Sarkisian made it clear that he didn't think it would take long to turn the program around and get it back to the high level of success that UW football has enjoyed throughout its history. If the 2009 season was an indication, Sarkisian was right. Washington, which posted a winless season for the first time in school history the year before Sarkisian signed on, surged to a 5-7 record in 2009, an improvement of five victories over the previous year. No BCS-conference school in the nation could boast such improvement in terms of wins in 2009. And, Sarkisian's Husky squad pulled off that feat against a schedule that included 10 opponents who ended the season bowl-eligible. Improvements came in nearly every category. Washington scored 26.1 points per game, nearly double their per-game average in 2008 (13.2). Meanwhile, UW opponents scored nearly 12 points fewer per game, dropping from an average of 38.6 to 26.7. Thus, the Huskies' average scoring margin made a drastic improvement of nearly 25 points. Total offense was up more than 110 yards per game while total defense improved to the tune of 62 fewer yards per game allowed. Rushing offense, rushing defense, passing offense, punting, punt returns, sacks, turnovers and third-down conversion rate, among others, all made marked improvement. But most of all, owing to Coach Sarkisian's stated top goal, the Huskies played hard and earned respect from each and every opponent. The result was not only more wins, but a reinvigorated Husky Stadium and momentum. From a memorable 16-13, last-second victory over third-ranked USC, to a near-miraculous victory over Arizona thanks to a late interception. From the first shutout in the Apple Cup since 1964 (30-0 over Washington State) to a season-crowning, 42-10 victory over 19th-ranked California, the season was full of highlights and good memories. Sarkisian came to the UW with a wealth of experience as a quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator. His string of success is nearly unprecedented as, during his time at USC, he coached two Heisman Trophy winners and oversaw one of the nation's most consistent and dominant offenses. Sarkisian spent 2007 and 2008 as the Trojans' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. He had also previously served as assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach (2005-06), quarterbacks coach (2002-03) and as an offensive assistant (2001) at USC, for a total of seven seasons there. During his seven seasons as a member of the Trojans' staff, the team has posted a combined 74-15 record. As offensive coordinator, his record was 22-3. Aside from his various roles at USC, Sarkisian also spent one season as quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders in 2004 and as QBs coach at El Camino College in Torrance, Calif., in 2000, his first coaching job. Sarkisian starred at the quarterback position at the prep, collegiate and pro levels. After his stand-out career at Brigham Young University, he was played for the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League for three seasons (1997-99). He had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career at BYU, playing under legendary coach Lavell Edwards. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 touchdowns in his career. His 162.0 career passing efficiency rating ranked third on the all-time NCAA list. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, No. 7 all-time) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the 1997 Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996, earned second-team All-America honors and played in the East-West Shrine Game and Hula Bowl. As a junior in 1995, he earned all-conference honors and led BYU to the WAC title. Sarkisian transferred to BYU from El Camino Junior College, where he played two seasons (1993-94). He was a first-team Junior College All-America selection as a sophomore and earned all-conference honors in 1993 as a freshman. He also played baseball at El Camino in 1993. He originally enrolled at USC as a baseball player before transferring. Sarkisian was a standout football and baseball player at West Torrance (Calif.) High. He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from BYU in 1997 after receiving his associate's degree from El Camino in 1994.

COACHING STAFF: Washington's assistant coaching staff returns entirely in tact from last season. Last year, every member of the staff was new to the UW (though a couple had worked at the UW in prior staffs). While there are a few of coaches who made their way to Washington via USC, like head coach Steve Sarkisian, more notably, many of the new coaches have very specific ties to the Northwest. Nick Holt is the UW's defensive coordinator, the role he served at USC for three seasons prior to his arrival in Seattle. Holt, however, is tied to the Pacific Northwest by way of the fact that he was head coach at Idaho in 2004 and 2005. He was also an assistant with the Vandals from 1990-97. Offensive coordinator and QBs coach Doug Nussmeier, who grew up in the Portland, Ore., area was a star quarterback at Idaho, where he passed for 10,824 career yards and won the Walter Payton Award (the I-AA Heisman). He's also in the Idaho Athletic Hall of Fame, just like running backs coach Joel Thomas. Thomas, a native of Port Angeles, Wash., is still the Vandals' all-time leader in rushes, rushing yards and rushing TDs. Offensive line coach and run game coordinator Dan Cozzetto, who went to high school in Spokane, is another Idaho grad. Cozzetto, who was also the Washington line coach in 2003, came to the UW from Arizona State, but also coached at Idaho under former head coach Dennis Erickson. Safeties coach Jeff Mills, who played his college football at Western Washington, was a graduate assistant at the UW in 1990 and 1991 under coach Don James. He helped the Dawgs to Pac-10 titles both seasons and the national championship in '91. Mills has also coached at Idaho. Defensive line coach/special teams coordinator/recruiting coordinator Johnny Nansen grew up in Long Beach, Calif., but played football at Washington State and came to Seattle after spending five seasons at Idaho (including two under Holt). Finally, as to the Idaho connection, linebackers coach Mike Cox is a native of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, played for the Vandals under Erickson and former Husky head coach Keith Gilbertson, and coached in Moscow from 1987-94. He came to Washington from the St. Louis Rams. Cornerbacks coach Demetric Martin was new to the Northwest last year, having previously worked with Sarkisian at USC. Another newcomer to this part of the country, receivers coach Jimmie Dougherty, played at Missouri and had most recently coached at the University of San Diego. Washington's two graduate assistants are Mike Anderson (defense) and Brent Miller (offense). Anderson played at Idaho under Holt and is a native of Lewiston, Idaho. Miller, whose playing days at Arizona State ended with the 2007 season, once scored a game-winning touchdown in overtime at Husky Stadium.

ENTIRE STAFF RETURNS: For the first time in two decades, the entire Husky football coaching staff returns in 2010. The head coach and all nine full-time assistants are back from the 2009 staff. The last time that happened at Washington was in 1990, when head coach Don James' entire staff returned after the 1989 season. Incidentally, both graduate assistants also return in 2010, though that wasn't the case in 1990, when more GAs were allowed on a staff.

HUSKIES vs. ORANGE HISTORY: Not surprisingly for two teams on the other sides of the country from one another, Washington's history vs. Syracuse is relatively brief. Washington is 2-1 vs. the Orange, with the most recent meeting coming in the Carrier Dome in the 2007 season opener, the UW's first game with Jake Locker at quarterback. Washington won that game, 42-12. Tailback Louis Rankin led the way with 147 rushing yards and two TDs while Locker was more than solid in his college debut. The redshirt-freshman went 14-for-19 for 142 yards passing while rushing for 83 yards and two touchdowns on just 10 carries. The two teams also played two games back in the 1970s, one at each team's home field. On Sept. 29, 1973, Syracuse traveled to Husky Stadium, where the UW picked up a 21-7 win. After a scoreless first quarter, the Huskies got on the board in the second when Steve Lipe blocked a punt and scored after a three-yard runback. In the third quarter, Husky QB Denny Fitzpatrick ran in from three yards out and, in the fourth, a 63-yard

run from backup quarterback James Anderson made it 21-0. Syracuse QB Robert Sutton scored on a one-yard run about midway through the final period to account for the visitors' only points. Despite notching 22 first downs to the Huskies' nine, Syracuse was out-gained, 283 yards to 214, in total offense. Four years later, on Sept. 24, 1977, Syracuse evened the series with a 22-20 win at Archbold Stadium. The game was won on a 31-yard field goal by Dave Jacobs with only 23 seconds remaining. The Orange took the early lead with a first-quarter TD run from Jim Sessler and a second-quarter field goal from Jacobs. However, Washington took the lead by halftime as Warren Moon connected with receiver Spider Gaines on a pair of scoring passes (25 and 51 yards) in the second quarter. In the third, Jacobs kicked a second field goal and the Orange went back on top when a Husky punt was blocked and recovered in the endzone. After a two-point attempt failed, Syracuse led, 19-14. Moon put the Huskies back on top with a four-yard run with 3:38 remaining in the game (a two-point attempt also failed), but Bill Hurley led a drive that ended in Jacobs' third field goal of the day to win it. Hurley finished with 113 yards while Art Monk added 83 for the home team. Moon completed 16-of-25 passes for 257 yards and two TDs for the UW while Gaines caught seven passes for 169 yards.

WASHINGTON-SYRACUSE TIES: Not surprisingly, considering the geography, there aren't many ties between players on the Washington and Syracuse rosters. The Orange roster does not include any players from the state of Washington while the Husky roster has, somewhat surprisingly, one New Yorker: senior full-back Dorson Boyce (Queens). Perhaps more surprisingly, there are a handful of Huskies and Orange who attended the same high school somewhere other than New York or Washington. Syracuse QB Jonny Miller and Husky receiver Devin Aguilar both attended Mullen High in Colorado. Husky freshmen Nick Montana and Erik Kohler both went to Oaks Christian in Southern California, the alma mater of SU safety Ryan Ahern. (It's worth noting that UW's Anthony Boyles and SU's Mikhail Marinovich attended *different* high schools in Southern California, both named Junipero Serra). While there are no direct connections between the members of the UW and Syracuse coaching staffs, it's worth noting that Orange running backs coach Tyrone Wheatley faced the UW in the 1992 and 1993 Rose Bowls. In the first of those two, a 34-14 Husky win clinched the national title, he ran for 68 yards and a TD on nine carries. The following year, he was the game's MVP after running for 253 yards and three scores on just 15 carries in a 38-31 Michigan win.

HUSKIES vs. THE BIG EAST: Washington has played against only four of the eight current football-playing members of the Big East Conference: Cincinnati, Pittsburgh and, of course, Syracuse. The Huskies are 4-5 all-time against that trio. Aside from their 2-1 record against the Orange (detailed earlier), the Dawgs are 1-0 against UConn (a 21-17 win in Seattle in 1974), and 1-4 against the Panthers. Washington and Pitt first played in the 1937 Rose Bowl (a Panthers win). Pitt also won a 1939 game at Husky Stadium. In slightly more recent times, the Huskies won in Seattle in 1961, lost at Pitt in 1963 and lost in Seattle in 1979.

PLAYING THE TRUE FRESHMEN: In the BYU game, Washington set a school record by utilizing 13 true freshmen. The largest number of true freshmen every to play *in a season* at the UW was 12, in 2008. Here's a list of freshmen who played at BYU: TB Jesse Callier, CB Gregory Ducre, FB Zach Fogerson, LB Princeton Fuimaono, LB Garret Gilliland, TE Michael Hartvigson, DE Hau'oli Jamora, OT Erik Kohler, S Sean Parker, LB Cooper Pelluer, DT Sione Potoa'e, WR Kevin Smith and S Taz Stevenson.

TEAM NOTES

THE RED ZONE: In the UW's season opener at BYU, both teams scored in each trip inside the opponents' red zone. However, Washington scored touchdowns in both of its red-zone trips while BYU scored only one TD to go with two field goals in its three tries. CAPTAINS: At the "Raise the Woof!" kickoff celebration held on Aug. 27, the four captains for the 2010 season, as voted by their teammates, were revealed. They are senior LB Mason Foster (Seaside, Calif.), junior offensive tackle Senio Kelemete (Seattle, Wash.), senior QB Jake Locker (Ferdale, Wash.) and senior S Nate Williams (Renton, Wash.). Locker was also voted as a season captain in 2009. Additionally, at each game, two game captains accompany the regular four on to the field for the coin flip. Here's a list of those:

at BYU: Cort Dennison, Nick Montana

DECADE AFTER DECADE: Washington has won a conference title and a trip to the Rose Bowl in each of the last nine decades, dating back to the 1920s when Washington won the berth in 1923 and 1925. In the 1930s, the Dawgs won the '36 title. In the '40s, Washington earned the trip in 1943 and then barely slipped in under the wire in the 1950s, winning the 1959 crown. The Huskies won two Rose Bowl berths in the 1960s -- 1960 and 1963 -- and one in the 1970s (1977). Titles in 1980 and 1982 did it for that decade and three straight trips to Pasadena to begin the 1990s covered that 10-year span. In the 2000s, UW was the first team to earn Rose Bowl berths in nine straight decades. USC joined the Dawgs in that distinction in 2004 after their New Year's Day appearance in Pasadena.

FINISHING FIRST OR SECOND: Washington has finished either first or second in the conference (including ties) in 18 of the last 33 seasons, dating back to a fourth-place finish in 1976. Over that span, Washington has won the championship (outright or shared) eight times -- 1977, 1980, 1981, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1995 and 2000 -- while finishing second 10 other times.

THE 100-YARD FACTOR: Since the 1947 season, Washington is 167-51-3 (.762) when a Husky player rushes for 100 yards in a game. The Huskies went 3-1 in such games in 2003, 1-1 in 2004, 2-3 in 2005, 2-1 in 2006; 3-4 in 2007; 0-2 in 2008. Last year, however, the UW was 1-4 in such games as Chris Polk's four 100-yard efforts came at Notre Dame, vs. Oregon, at UCLA, at OSU and vs. WSU.

HISTORY LESSON: Successfully rushing the football and winning go hand-in-hand for the Huskies. Since 1990, UW has rushed for 200 yards in a game 73 times. The Huskies' record stands at 60-12-1 (.829) in those contests. Since the 1995 season, Washington is 35-9-1 (.789) when rushing for 200 yards.

PLAYING AT HOME: Washington has gone unbeaten at home 13 times in its history, including six times in the last 20 seasons. Washington has won 84 of its last 127 (.665) games at Husky Stadium with one tie (84-42-1). Since 1980, the Huskies stand 132-53-2 (.711) at home. Since 1990, the Huskies are 53-30-1 (.637) at Husky Stadium vs. Pac-10 opponents.

HISTORIC HUSKY STADIUM: The 2009 season marks the 90th season of play in Husky Stadium. Original construction on the facility was completed in 1920 when Washington played one game in the new campus facility. Thanks to several major renovations, Husky Stadium's seating capacity has increased to its current total of 72,500. UW's all-time record in Husky Stadium currently stands at 349-165-21 (.672).

FAMILY TIES: As is the case with most seasons of Husky football, there are a number of players on the Washington football team related to either current or former Huskies. The team has two sets of brothers in Jermaine (Jr. WR) and Jamaal (Fr. LB) Kearse, and Johri (Jr. TB) and Zach (Fr. FB) Fogerson. Both Fogersons are related to both Nate Robinson (former UW football and basketball player; current New York Knick) and former Husky basketball standout Dion Brown. Sophomore linebacker Jordan Wallace is the younger brother of former Husky safety C.J. Wallace. Another sophomore, Talia Crichton, is a cousin of former DE Daniel Te'o-Nesheim RS-freshman quarterback Keith Price is a cousin of former UW tailback Jelani Harrison. A little further afield, freshman TE Michael Hartvigson is a cousin to former UW baseball pitchers Chad and Grant Hartvigson. Incidentally, at least four Huskies have close family ties to Washington State. Both Cooper Pelluer and Cameron Elisara's fathers played at WSU, as did Husky cornerback Desmond Trufant's brother Marcus. Sophomore safety Nate Fellner is the grandson of former WSU head coach Jim Sweeney. Pelluer's uncle Steve, however, was a UW quarterback and his father Scott was an assistant coach at Washington.

OVERALL ATHLETIC SUCCESS: Having firmly established itself as one of the top broad-based Division I intercollegiate athletics programs in the country, the University of Washington once again placed in the top echelon in the annual NACDA Directors' Cup competition in the 2009-2010 academic year. Husky athletics finished 24th among all NCAA Division I institutions (283 schools earned at least a point and were ranked) in the annual standings. Washington scored a total of 770.75 points in the Director's Cup, which is based solely on NCAA championship competition (and therefore didn't include the Huskies' strong showing in men's rowing, which is not an NCAA sport). In 2009-10, Husky teams won Pac-10 titles in women's cross country, men's basketball, men's rowing and softball. The men's hoops team won the Pac-10 tourney and proceeded to the Sweet 16 in the NCAA tournament while the softball program made yet another College World Series appearance. The previous year, 2008-09, was highlighted by a number of team and individual successes, including NCAA championships in women's cross country and softball, plus the national title in men's rowing. The Huskies also won the Pac-10 championship in women's cross country (posting the best possible score), men's basketball and men's golf and posted top-10 NCAA finishes in men's golf, women's rowing, women's volleyball and women's tennis in 2008-09.
