Quick Hits

- Braxton Cleman's 15 receptions last week at USC broke the UW single-game record (it was 12) and were also the second-most (tied) in Pac-10 history.
- Junior Cody Pickett has thrown for more than 300 yards in all seven games this year. Prior to this year, no Husky quarterback had ever thrown for 300 yards in more than two consecutive games.

WASHINGTON vs. #NR/25 ARIZONA STATE UW Returns to Desert for Third Straight Year

THE GAME: The Washington football team (4-3 overall and 1-2 in the Pac-10 Conference) will attempt to solve its road woes this week when it travels to face first-place Arizona State (5-2, 3-0) Saturday at Sun Devil Stadium. The game marks the third straight season that the Huskies have played the Sun Devils in Tempe. Game time at Sun Devil Stadium is set for 7:00 p.m. (MST and PDT ... daylight savings time doesn't switch back until later that night). The Huskies, who fell out of both the AP and coaches' rankings after losing at USC last Saturday, haven't won away from Husky Stadium since last year's game at Arizona State (a 33-31 win on a last-second John Anderson field goal), a stretch of five straight losses outside of Seattle (including the Holiday Bowl). ASU, tied with Washington State atop the Pac-10 standings, earned the No. 25 spot in the USA Today/ESPN coaches' poll, though the Devils somehow didn't earn even a point in the Associated Press ranking. After travelling to Tempe, the Huskies will return home for their final two home dates of the season, vs. UCLA and Oregon State.

HUSKIES vs. DEVILS HISTORY: The Huskies hold a 15-8 record all-time against Arizona State in a series that only dates back to 1975. That game marked the only time that the two teams ever played one another prior to the Sun Devils joining the Pac-10 Conference for the 1978 season. Since then, the two have played one another every year between 1978 and now except for the 1983 and 1984 seasons. The Huskies lost that first-ever meeting at Tempe in 1975, 35-12, but routed the 12th-ranked Devils in the next meeting, winning 41-7 at Husky Stadium in 1978. One of the two teams (or both) has been ranked in 11 of the last 12 meetings, the only exception the 1999 game when the Devils came to Husky Stadium and beat Washington, 28-7. Some of the Huskies' most memorable games in recent history have come vs. ASU. In the 1995 season-opener, tailback Rashaan Shehee hit receiver Fred Coleman with a 30-yard TD pass late in the fourth quarter to give Washington a 23-20 win. The following year at Tempe, Washington trailed 42-21 before backup QB Brock Huard came on to lead the Huskies to three four-quarter TDs, but Robert Nycz kicked a 38-yard field goal with 0:02 left to win, 45-42. In 1998 at Sun Devil Stadium, the Huskies pulled off the "Miracle in the Desert" as Huard hit tight end Reggie Davis with a 63-yard pass on fourth-and-17 with 0:28 left in the game to pull out a 42-38 Washington win. Last season, the Huskies capped a seven-minute, 12-second drive with a 30-yard field goal with no time remaining to edge the Devils, 33-31. UW coach Rick Neuheisel is 2-1 against Arizona State while Dirk Koetter, ASU's second-year head man, is 0-1 vs. the Huskies as a head coach. As offensive coordinator at Oregon in 1996 and 1997, Koetter helped the Ducks to a win over the UW in 1996 and a loss the next year.

ALREADY NO. 1: Junior quarterback Cody Pickett is having an unprecedented season in terms of his passing statistics. Washington, well-known for producing NFL quarterbacks, has never seen the prolific numbers that Pickett is posting this season. Only seven games into his junior year, Pickett has already set a new single-season passing yards record with 2,601 this year (surpassing Cary Conklin's 2,569 in 1989). Now with 5,016 career yards, Pickett is only 727 yards shy of the UW career passing yards record of 5,742 (Brock Huard). Pickett also has a shot at the Pac-10 single-season passing record, especially with the 12-game schedule this year. Pickett must throw for 1,037 yards (an average of 207.4 per game) to break the conference record of 3,637 yards, set by Washington State's Ryan Leaf in 1997. Pickett's 2,601 passing yards this season already rank No. 40 in Pac-10 history, but he's only 332 yards away from the all-time top-10. Pickett is also only three completions short of Steve Pelluer's 1983 Husky record of 213.

TELEVISION: There is no live television coverage of the Washington-Arizona State game. However, the game will air on tape delay on Fox Sports in the Northwest with David Locke and former Husky QB Sonny Sixkiller providing the call. The replay will air Sunday at 3:00 p.m. Also, "The Washington Football Experience" airs each Thursday during the season on Fox Sports. The new program is an up-close look at each Husky game, with one-on-one player interviews and sideline photography.

RADIO: The Husky Sports Network, with its flagship station KJR 950-AM, will carry the live broadcast of every football game to five different states on 21 different radio stations. Longtime broadcast team Bob Rondeau (play-by-play), Chuck Nelson (color) and Bill Swartz (sidelines) provide the call.

THE COACH: Husky head coach Rick Neuheisel is in the midst of his fourth year at the helm of the Washington program. In three-plus seasons, Neuheisel has led the Huskies to an 30-13 (.698) overall mark and an 20-7 record in Pac-10 play and finished either first or second in the league each year. Last year, the Huskies made their second runner-up finish under Neuheisel, going 8-3 in the regular season (6-2 in the conference) before falling short in a barn-burner vs. Texas in the Holiday Bowl. In 2000, Washington posted an 11-1 overall record, a 7-1 conference mark and shared the Pac-10 Championship. After beating Purdue, 34-24, in the Rose Bowl, the Huskies finished with a No. 3 ranking in the final national polls. In his first season at Washington (1999), Neuheisel led the Huskies to a 7-5 overall mark, a second-place tie (6-2) in the Pac-10 and a trip to the Culligan Holiday Bowl. Neuheisel became the first Husky coach in history to lead the UW to a bowl game in his first season as head coach. Prior to coming to Washington, Neuheisel served four seasons as the head coach at Colorado, posting a 33-14 (.702) overall mark with the Buffaloes. His career record, in seven-plus seasons, is 63-27 (.700). Neuheisel worked for six seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, UCLA, before joining Bill McCartney's Colorado staff in 1994 as the quarterbacks coach. Originally a walkon at UCLA, Neuheisel won the starting quarterback position as a senior and led the Bruins to the 1983 Pac-10 championship. He was named the MVP of the 1984 Rose Bowl that saw UCLA defeat Illinois, 45-9. Washington fans remember Neuheisel's tremendous performance when he completed 25 of 27 passes to set an NCAA completions percentage record that was only recently broken by Tennessee's Tee Martin. Neuheisel, a member of the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame, still holds the Bruins' single-season (69.3) and career (68.3) completion percentage records.

RICK THE BRAVE: Husky head coach Rick Neuheisel gave one of his old UCLA teammates an assist earlier this year when his donation to the Alcorn State football program paid a large portion of the cost of the Braves' new uniforms. Alcorn defensive coordinator Karl Morgan and Neuheisel were classmates at UCLA and both played on the Bruins' 1983 Pac-10 championship team.

CONTINUITY OF COACHING: Going back to 1957, Washington has had only four head football coaches: Jim Owens (1957-75), Don James (1976-92), Jim Lambright (1993-99) and Rick Neuheisel (1999-present). In that time, the nine other Pac-10 schools have had an average of about eight coaches each, a total of 74 (counting some of them – Bill Walsh, John Robinson, etc. – more than once). Oregon has had the next fewest with only six head coaches over that span. Arizona State, California, Oregon State, UCLA, USC and Washington State have had eight each. Arizona's had nine head coaches since '57 and Stanford has had 11.

COACHING STAFF: Seven of nine members of Washington's 2001 assistant coaching staff return for 2002. Six of the nine current assistants have been on the UW staff since Rick Neuheisel's arrival prior to the 1999 season. However, despite having seven of nine assistant coaches back, there has been a little shuffling in the position assignments. The two coaches who left — inside linebackers coach Tom Williams to Stanford and running backs coach Tony Alford to Iowa State — have been replaced by newcomers Cornell Jackson and Bobby Kennedy. Jackson will coach the inside linebackers in a direct switch for Williams, but Kennedy will serve as wide receivers coach, overseeing a position that was coached by a graduate assistant last year. Veteran coach Chuck Heater moves from cornerbacks to running backs coach while Bobby Hauck will expand his duties from safeties to all the defensive backs. The UW coaching staff includes seven coaches that have served as coordinators and two (Keith Gilbertson and Steve Axman) that have been head coaches. Gilbertson served as the head man at Idaho (1986-88) and California (1992-95) while Axman was the coach at Northern Arizona from 1990 to 1997. Axman also once served as offensive coordinator at UCLA. Defensive coordinator Tim Hundley has been a coordinator at Oregon State and Idaho while defensive line coach Randy Hart was a coordinator at UW from 1995-98. Hauck headed up the special teams at Colorado before coming to Seattle while Heater was the defensive coordinator at Colorado State (1991-92). Offensive line coach Brent Myers was offensive coordinator at Northern Arizona under Axman and spent two seasons as coordinator at Boise State.

THE GAs: The Huskies added two new graduate assistant coaches to the staff this year, both with names that will be familiar to Seattle-area football fans. Luther Carr III will assist on offense while Ty Gregorak is the defensive graduate assistant. Carr was head coach at Seattle's Garfield High the last four seasons and is the son of Luther Carr II, who was a standout Husky player in the late 1950s. Two of Carr's uncles, Gary and Dave, also earned varsity letters at Washington, in football and basketball, respectively. Gregorak, who prepped at West Valley High in Spokane, Wash., earned three letters as a linebacker at Colorado, playing two varsity seasons under Rick Neuheisel in Boulder. A 2000 Big 12 All-Academic selection, Gregorak retired from playing prior to his senior season due to shoulder and knee injuries. As a junior in 2000, he started eight games and finished fourth on the team in tackles.

LAST YEAR vs. ARIZONA STATE: John Anderson booted a 30-yard field goal with no time left in the fourth quarter as the Huskies pulled out another fourth-quarter victory, beating Arizona State, 33-31. The Huskies got the ball at their own 10-yard line with 7:12 remaining in the final period and used all 7:12 over an 18-play drive. The Huskies looked as though they might finally get an easy win in the early going, jumping to a 17-0 lead in the second quarter. Cody Pickett tossed TD passes to Todd Elstrom and Reggie Williams, and Anderson kicked a 31-yarder to account for that 17-0 margin. After an ASU touchdown, Pickett ran in from two yards out to give Washington a 24-7 lead. The Sun Devils, however, stormed back, kicking a field goal before halftime and opening the third quarter with a 10-play, 80-yard drive that resulted in a three-yard TD run from Tom Pace. After a blocked punt for a safety, the Devils got six more on a 33-yard pass from Jeff Krohn to Shaun McDonald. Washington responded with a 23-yard run by Willie Hurst to go back in front, 30-25, but Delvon Flowers capped another 80-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run. Hurst had a career-high 185 rushing yards to lead the Huskies while McDonald caught nine passes for 194 yards.

THREE IN A ROW IN TEMPE: Earlier this season, the Huskies played their third straight game vs. Arizona in Seattle, marking the first time since 1940 that the Huskies had played a conference opponent three straight seasons at Husky Stadium. This week, the UW will travel to Sun Devil Stadium for the third consecutive season. The last time the Huskies played a conference opponent on the road three straight years was 1933-35, when the Dawgs played at USC three times in a row. The Huskies played three straight games at Stanford just a bit more than a decade ago, but not in consecutive seasons — 1988, 1990 and 1991 (the two teams didn't play one another in 1989). Incidentally, the UW went 3-0 in its three home games vs. Arizona and are 2-0 thusfar the last two years in Tempe.

WASHINGTON-ARIZONA STATE TIES: By intra-conference standards, there are almost no ties between the UW and Arizona State football teams. Of course, UW head coach Rick Neuheisel grew up in Tempe and attended McClintock High. Additionally, Husky offensive line coach Brent Myers was offensive coordinator under current Devils coach Dirk Koetter at Boise State in Koetter's first two seasons with the Broncos, 1998 and 1999. Myers served alongside a number of Koetter's current assistant coaches. Washington's roster includes only three players from the state of Arizona: linebacker Marquis Cooper (Gilbert), defensive lineman Terry Johnson (Tempe) and punter Derek McLaughlin (Mesa). Arizona State has two Washingtonians on its roster: wide receiver Skyler Fulton (Olympia) and fullback Mike Karney (Kent). Fulton's older brother, Josh, played one season of baseball at Washington in 2000.

USC REDUX: Washington's air attack broke another bunch of records, but in the end, it wasn't nearly enough as the 19th-ranked Trojans rolled to a 41-21 win. Cody Pickett, only seven games into the season, broke the UW single-season record for passing yardage, adding 350 more to his total to surpass Cary Conklin's 1989 record. Pickett completed 34 of his 61 pass attempts with two interceptions and three touchdowns while tailback Braxton Cleman set a new Husky record with 15 receptions. Reggie Williams had his school-record eighth 100-yard receiving game and his record-tying third straight with 134 yards and a score on seven catches. However, the Huskies were held to minus-five rushing yards and the Trojans threw for 348 in a game that was never very close. Washington seemed to get a break on the game's first play when first-time starter Sam Cunningham (in for injured regular CB Roc Alexander) picked off a pass from USC QB Carson Palmer. However, the Huskies' field goal attempt on the ensuing drive was blocked. After an exchange of punts, Palmer hit Mike Williams for the first of three Williams TDs on the day, this time from 43 yards out. The Huskies scored on a five-yard pass from Pickett to Paul Arnold, but Palmer struck back, hitting Keary Colbert with a 61-yard scoring pass. After two Ryan Killeen field goals and two more Williams TDs gave USC a 34-7 lead at the end of three quarters, the Huskies began to make things interesting when Pickett threw touchdowns to Ware and Reggie Williams. However, the Huskies next drive after the Williams TD ended on a fourth-down incompleting, and the Trojans put the game away when tailback Justin Fargas ran in from 13 yards out. Palmer finished 21-for-34 for 348 yards and four touchdowns while both Mike Williams (159) and Keary Colbert (146) both surpassed 100 yards receiving.

RANKED-WINS STREAK: Washington is still in search of its first win over a ranked opponent this year (the Huskies have had only two chances so far). If the UW does beat a ranked team in 2002, it will mark the 14th straight year the Huskies have beaten a team ranked in the Associated Press poll. Washington's upset of 11th-ranked Michigan in the last season's opener marked the 13th straight year. Washington has defeated an AP-ranked team in 24 of its last 25 seasons prior to 2002. The only break in the streak came in 1988 when the Huskies played only two games against nationally-ranked foes — UCLA (No. 2) and USC (No. 3), losing both of those games.

TEAM NOTES

HOME vs. NON CONFERENCE: Washington has been very tough to beat in home, non-conference games over the last couple of decades or so. Going back to (and including) the 1981 season, the Huskies have posted a 43-5 record against non-Pac-10 foes in Husky Stadium. Those five losses have come to Air Force (1999), Nebraska (1997), Notre Dame (1995), Colorado (1989) and Oklahoma State (1985). The wins during that stretch include victories over No. 11 Michigan last year, No. 4 Miami in 2000, and No. 12 Nebraska in 1992, to name just three. Coach Rick Neuheisel is 8-1 in such games, claiming the wins over Michigan last season and Miami in 2000, with the lone loss coming in his first home game as Husky coach vs. Air Force in 1999. With the non-conference slate done for the year, those records won't change again until 2003.

TOUGH AFTER TURNOVERS: While Washington has turned the ball over three more times than its opponents this year (13 to 16), the Huskies have been much more successful turning turnovers into points than have their opponents. In fact, the Huskies have scored 10 times after their 13 takeaways, and their three missed opportunities came on a missed field goal and a blocked field goal. The third came on the game's final play vs. Arizona, and thus did not present a chance to be converted into a score. In the meantime, UW opponents have scored six times on 16 turnovers – five touchdowns and one field goal.

THE SACKS ARE BACK: Washington's eight sacks vs. Wyoming were the most by a Husky team in a single game since 1998, when the UW defense posted a school-record 13 sacks in back-to-back games against Utah State and California. Through seven games, Washington has already compiled a total of 23 sacks, two more than the Huskies' total from all last season. Redshirt freshman defensive end Manase Hopoi currently leads the team with five sacks, equalling the total of last year's season-leader, linebacker Ben Mahdavi.

TO BE CONTINUED: Washington's 2002 two-deep is both young and experienced, which bodes well not just for 2002, but for 2003 as well. Just nine of the 46 players on Washington's season-opening offensive and defensive depth charts (including co-No. 2s) are seniors, meaning that barring unexpected attrition, 37 of Washington's top 46 offensive and defensive players will return for the 2003 season, including 20 of 25 listed starters (includes co-starters). The list includes nine of 10 offensive linemen (with senior guard Elliott Zajac the lone senior), all six defensive linemen, and all eight members of the secondary, not to mention skill-position standouts Cody Pickett, Reggie Williams and Rich Alexis. Youth, however, does not necessarily equal inexperience. Of those 37 underclassmen, 27 already boast at least one letter, and 17 have started at least one game at Washington.

.500 OR BETTER SEASONS: With a winning season once again in 2001, last year the Huskies played their 25th consecutive non-losing season. The last time that Washington finished below .500 was 1976, when the Dawgs went 5-6. Since then, the Huskies are 211-84-3 (.713) overall. The Huskies' 25-season streak of non-losing seasons is the 14th longest in NCAA history (tied with Florida State's current streak) and the fourth longest current streak. THE SHUTOUT STREAK: Washington's loss at USC marked the 247th consecutive game in which Washington has not been shut out. That's the best streak among Pac-10 schools. BYU has the nation's longest streak at 345 games (NCAA record), while Texas is second with 259 games. The last opponent to hold the Huskies scoreless was UCLA (31-0) on Nov. 7, 1981. Washington has played 163 Pac-10 Conference games since then without a shutout — the second best current streak among Pac-10 schools.

DECADE AFTER DECADE: Washington has won a conference title and a trip to the Rose Bowl in each of the last nine decades, dating back to the 1920s when Washington won the berth in 1923 and 1925. In the 1930s, the Dawgs won the '36 title. In the '40s, Washington earned the trip in 1943 and then barely slipped in under the wire in the 1950s, winning the 1959 crown. The Huskies won two Rose Bowl berths in the 1960s -- 1960 and 1963 -- and one in the 1970s (1977). Titles in 1980 and 1982 did it for that decade and three straight trips to Pasadena to begin the 1990s covered that 10-year span. Now in the 2000s, UW has become the first and only team to earn Rose Bowl berths in nine straight decades. USC has the chance, over the next eight years, to equal the Huskies if it wins the title sometime this decade.

LAST-SECOND MAGIC: Four of Washington's six Pac-10 victories last season came down to the wire. The Huskies beat California by three points (31-28), USC by three (27-24), Arizona by three (31-28) and Arizona State by two (33-31). Washington trailed in the fourth quarter in each of those games but came back to win. In both the USC and the Arizona State games, Washington got a field goal from John Anderson with no time left on the clock to get the victory. The Huskies hadn't previously won a game on the final play since Chuck Nelson kicked a field goal to beat Stanford, 27-24, in 1980. In the win over Arizona, quarterback Cody Pickett closed out a record-setting passing day by scoring on a three-yard run with only 13 seconds remaining. Against ASU, the Huskies took the ball on their own 10-yard line and used up the final 7:12 of the game, driving for the winning field goal in 18 plays. The Cal win wasn't nearly so close, by comparison. The Huskies entered the fourth quarter trailing 21-17, but scored two touchdowns to take a 31-21 lead before Cal scored to close the gap with 3:23 remaining. The win over Stanford was even more comfortable by comparison. However, the score was tied at 28-28 until Willie Hurst scored with 3:48 left in the game to give the Huskies a lead. Hurst tacked on the final TD with only four seconds on the clock.

TEAM NOTES

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES: In 43 games under coach Rick Neuheisel, the winning margin (for either side) has been seven points or fewer 23 times. In those 23 games decided by a touchdown or less, Washington is 16-7 and had won 10 straight before falling to Texas, 47-43 in last year's Holiday Bowl. Washington had lost three straight such games (Texas, Michigan, Cal) before the Oct. 12, four-point win over Arizona.

BEATING THE RANKED TEAMS: Washington is 9-11 against top-10 teams since 1990. Also since 1990, the Huskies have gone 27-27-1 against top 25 teams. Here's a look at the Huskies' record against top-10 foes over the last 12 seasons:

FOURTH-QUARTER COMEBACKS: Under Rick Neuheisel, Washington has had to come from behind in 21 of its 30 wins. That total includes eight such wins in 2000 and six in 2001, and the San Jose State and Arizona games this year. Of those 21 come-from-behind wins, Washington has trailed in the fourth quarter and won 14 times, including five times last year. In the 2000 Arizona win, the Huskies took the lead in the fourth, then gave it up again before taking it back for good on their last drive. THE RED ZONE: Washington has been in its opponents' red zone nearly 12 more times that opponents have been inside the Huskies' 20-yard line. FINISHING FIRST OR SECOND: With its second-place finish in the Pac-10 last season, Washington has now finished either first or second in the conference (including ties) in 18 of the last 25 seasons, dating back to a fourth-place finish in 1976. Over that span, Washington has won the championship (outright or shared) eight times – 1977, 1980, 1981, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1995 and 2000 – while finishing second 10 other times.

TOP 25 STREAK BROKEN: The Huskies, who opened the 2000 season ranked No. 14 in the nation, hadn't been ranked out of the Associated Press' top 25 since before dropping out this week. The game last week at USC will marked the 31st straight game that the Huskies had entered ranked in the top 25. Washington had been ranked in the top 10 heading into nine of those games, including eight during the 2000 season.

THE 100-YARD FACTOR: Since the 1947 season, Washington is 154-35-3 (.809) when a Husky player rushes for 100 yards in a game. Last year, Washington had a 100-yard rusher only four times (all by then-senior Willie Hurst). The Huskies went 3-1 in those four games. Rich Alexis ran for 125 yards in the win over San Jose State earlier this season, the only 100-yard outing of the year.

HISTORY LESSON: Successfully rushing the football and winning go hand-in-hand for the Huskies. Since 1990, Washington has rushed for 200 yards in a game 56 times. The Huskies' record stands at 51-4-1 (.920) in those contests. Since the 1995 season, Washington is 26-1-1 (.946) when rushing for 200 yards.

PLAYING AT HOME: The Huskies finished the home slate with a spotless 6-0 record in 2001, marking the 13th time ever and the sixth time in the last 10 seasons that the Dawgs have played perfect at home (1991, 1992, 1994, 1996, 2000). Washington has won 66 of its last 79 (.842) games at Husky Stadium with one tie (66-12-1). Since 1980, the Huskies stand 114-23-2 (.827) at home. Since 1990, the Huskies are 42-8-1 (.833) at Husky Stadium vs. Pac-10 opponents.

HISTORIC HUSKY STADIUM: The 2002 season marks the 83rd season of play in Husky Stadium. Original construction on the facility was completed in 1920 when Washington played one game in the new campus facility. Thanks to several major renovations, Husky Stadium's seating capacity has increased to its current total of 72,500. That makes Husky Stadium the 24th-largest college football venue in the nation. It is the 20th-largest on-campus facility in the country. UW's all-time record in Husky Stadium currently stands at 331-134-21 (.703).

PLAYER NOTES

PICKETT MOVING UP: While junior quarterback Cody Pickett has already broken the Husky single-season passing record, he's also only 727 yards away from breaking the UW career passing record with nearly a season and a half yet to play. He also ranks on nearly ever other Washington career top-10 list, including No. 1 on several. In last Saturday's loss at USC, Pickett threw for 350 yards to extend his school record of seven consecutive 300-yard games. Pickett, who brought his career passing total to 5,016 yards, passed Cary Conklin (4,850) to climb to fifth all-time at Washington. Pickett, who is averaging 371.6 passing yards per game in 2002, needs 481 yards to pass Sonny Sixkiller (5,496) for fourth, and, again, is now just 727 yards shy of beating Brock Huard's school record of 5,742 passing yards. Pickett, who set a UW single-game record with 34 completions vs. Wyoming then broke it with 35 vs. Cal, now has 380 career completions, putting him seventh on that list. His career mark of 13.20 yards per completion ranks No. 8 and his 250.8 yards per game are currently a school record. His 19.0 completions per game are No. 1 and his career completion percentage of .602 is No. 2. Pickett boasts a slew of firsts: he is the first UW QB to post more than one career 400-yard game (he has three); the first to post nine 300-yard games; and the first to throw for 300 yards in more than two consecutive games (he has seven straight to start this current season). In just 20 career games Pickett already boasts five of the top seven and eight of Washington's top-15 single-game totals in passing yards. His 13 career 200-yard passing days are third-most in UW history and his nine 50-plus-yard passes equal Damon Huard's school record. Here are a number of UW top-10 lists on which Pickett ranks:

PLAYER NOTES

PICKETT AMONG NATION'S ELITE: With his outstanding start to the 2002 season, junior quarterback Cody Pickett has placed himself among the nation's top signalcallers. Pickett ranks No. 17 in the nation in passing efficiency, but his raw totals are even more outstanding. His 363.4 yards per game of total offense ranks No. 2 in the nation (behind Marshall's Byron Leftwich at 387.5) and his 30.0 pass completions per game also ranks No. 2, trailing only Texas Tech's Kliff Kingsbury (35.75). As a team, the Huskies rank No. 3 in passing offense and No. 8 in total offense in Division I-A.

PICKETT'S 2001 CHARGE: Last year, in only his first season at the helm of the Husky offense, Cody Pickett began his assault on the Husky record books. In 2001, Pickett broke four UW records, most significantly the single-game passing yardage mark. In a 31-28 win over Arizona (in which Pickett also ran in the winning touchdown with 13 seconds left), he broke Cary Conklin's 1989 record of 428 passing yards in a game with 455, despite a separated right (throwing) shoulder suffered two weeks earlier vs. USC. Pickett also broke the UW single-season record for passing yards per game (240.3), passing yards by a sophomore (2,403) and 50-plus yard passes in a season (five). CODY'S COURAGE: After sitting out the previous game and a half with a separated shoulder, then-sophomore quarterback Cody Pickett had the most prolific passing day in UW history in the Huskies' 31-28 win over Arizona on Oct. 20, 2001. But, not only did Pickett break the school passing yards record with 455, he also broke tackles on a three-yard run to score the game's winning touchdown with 13 seconds left. His 455 yards broke the school record of 428, set by Cary Conklin vs. Arizona State in 1989. His 49 attempts and 29 completions marked the highest such totals in the Pac-10 last season and the 29 completions were fifth-most in Husky history. Pickett was named Pac-10 and national Player of the Week.

CODY'S BOMBS: With three passes of over 70 yards in 2001 (78 to Paul Arnold, 75 to Patrick Reddick, 74 to Reggie Williams), and three more this year (89 and 80 to Williams, and 74 to Charles Frederick), Cody Pickett is the only Husky QB ever to throw six 70-plus-yard passes in a career. Only Damon Huard, Tom Porras and Billy Joe Hobert had ever thrown as many as two 70-yard passes.

WILLIAMS CHASING 'SUPER MARIO': Sophomore wide receiver Reggie Williams was only one game into his sophomore season when he passed the 1,000-yard mark for career receiving. In the loss at USC, he had his third straight 100-yard receiving game (tying a school record) and his eighth career 100-yard day (breaking the school record). Williams, who ranks No. 11 in the NCAA in yards per game and 14th in receptions per game, passed three former Huskies on the career Husky receiving chart and currently ranks No. 4. With 1,762 career receiving yards, Williams leapt past Lonzell Hill, Brian Slater and Paul Skansi in the USC game alone. In only his second season, Williams is now just 332 yards away from No. 1, and needs to average 66.4 yards per game the rest of the season to surpass Mario Bailey (2,093 yards from 1988-91) as the

Huskies' all-time receiving yards leader. Or, one could say that he needs to average only 19.5 yards over the next 17 games (through the end of his junior season) to break Bailey's record. Last week, with his 18th career game, Williams met the minimum number of games to rank on the UW career yards-per-game list and now ranks No. 1 by a large margin. With his average of 97.9 yards per game during his career thus far, Williams is 32 yards per game better than Brian Slater's former mark of 65.9. RECORD-SETTING REGGIE: Last year, UW wide receiver Reggie Williams became the first Husky ever to start the first game of his freshman season, and got his career off to a bang. Not only did he set four UW and Pac-10 records, but he had some of the more notable receiving days in recent UW history. In the first game of his career, the season opener vs. Michigan, he caught four balls for 134 yards. Against Washington State, he posted an 11-catch, 203-yard day, setting Apple Cup records in both categories. He went on to be named co-Freshman of the Year in the Pac-10 and was a Freshman All-American. Here are the four UW and Pac-10 freshman records he set:

PLAYER NOTES

BIG-PLAY PAUL: Washington senior receiver Paul Arnold, who switched from tailback to receiver prior to the 2001 season, has shown amazing versatility not only through his career, but in 2001 as well. Arnold, who caught the Huskies' first three passing TDs last year, had previously been a regular on the kickoff return team (he had a 100-yard kickoff return in 1999) and had also been the starting tailback. He has scored touchdowns as a running back, a receiver and on special teams. Despite starting at receiver last year, Arnold took several snaps at tailback during the Huskies' win at California, helping to fill in for an injury-depleted tailbacks corps. Despite playing some at tailback, he nonetheless led the Huskies with five catches for 116 yards and two touchdowns. He finished 2001 with four catches of over 40 yards, three for touchdowns. His 78-yard reception vs. Arizona was eighth (tied) in UW history. Arnold finished the year second on the team with both 43 receptions and 649 yards.

AFRO-PUFFS PREVAIL: Paul Arnold, the Huskies' senior receiver, has long been known for his ever-changing hair styles. This fall, fans who went to www.gohuskies.com were given the opportunity to choose which photo of Arnold would run in the UW's game program. The winner, by a long stretch, was the style Paul dubbed "Afro-Puffs," which prevailed over braids and a more traditional afro. More than 5,000 fans voted. Here are the final vote totals:

BRAX IS BACK: Fifth-year senior tailback Braxton Cleman returned to the starting lineup last Saturday at USC and made a major impact – not so much in the running game, but as a pass receiver. Cleman, who entered the game with 28 career receptions, shattered the UW single-game receptions record by catching 15 balls. His 15 catches smashed the Husky record of 12, set by receiver Dane Looker in a 1998 game at USC. Prior to Cleman's big day, the Husky record for receptions by a running back in a game was seven (a record shared by Cleman thanks to his seven catches vs. Cal earlier this season). His 15 catches, obviously, more than doubled that mark and tie for the second most in Pac-10 history (by backs *or* receivers). ASU's Ron Fair caught 19 passes in a 1989 game vs. Washington State and holds the Pac-10 record. Cleman's 15 receptions tied Daneane Douglas (Cal, 1998) and Johnnie Morton (USC, 1993) for second most in conference history. Incidentally, the NCAA record for most receptions in a game by a running back is 18, by Long Beach State's Mark Templeton vs. Utah State in 1986.

THE A-TRAIN: After a sensational freshman year in which he broke the school's freshman rushing record (726 yards) and posted four 100-yard games, junior Rich Alexis suffered through an admittedly rough season in 2001, gaining only 391 yards on the ground. In 2002, he seems to have returned to the form that earned him freshman All-America honors in 2000. Despite missing almost all of the California game with a sprained ankle, Alexis has already gained 440 yards on 118 carries, a 3.7-yard average. He's also scored six touchdowns in little six games. In the season opener at Michigan, Alexis fell only two yards short of the century mark, finishing with 98 yards. After posting 125 yards in the San Jose State game, he came back with 94 against Wyoming two weeks. He also shattered his old career receiving highs vs. the Cowboys with a team-high seven catches for 55 yards (old highs: 3 catches for 31 yards). Against Idaho, he rushed for 64 yards on 19 carried and caught six passes for another career high of 87 yards. Alexis ranks fifth in the Pac-10 in rushing with 73.3 rush yards per game.

ALEXIS RISING: With 1,557 rushing yards and 20 rushing TDs on 360 career carries, junior tailback Rich Alexis is climbing some UW top-10 career lists. Despite a sprained ankle that limited him to just one carry against Cal – a serious hit to his per-game numbers – Alexis still ranks No. 9 on the Huskies' career rushing yards-per-game list with 55.6. He has captured 10th place on the career rushing attempts list, and with 341 more yards, he'll catch Toussaint Tyler (1,898 yards) for 10th place in career rushing yards. Finally, with a TD vs. Arizona, he caught Marques Tuiasosopo (20) for ninth on the career rushing TDs chart. Here are some top-10 lists on which Alexis currently ranks:

PLAYER NOTES

STRONG-LEGGED FROSH: Husky sophomore punter Derek McLaughlin had one of the best seasons ever by a Husky punter as a freshman in 2001. McLaughlin's punting average of 41.2 yards per punt ranked fifth all-time in school history. In Washington's 31-28 win over Cal, McLaughlin set a school record with a 74-yard punt. Of McLaughlin's 52 punts in 2001, 16 were downed inside the 20-yard line, and only two went for touchbacks. McLaughlin, a member of the Church of Latter Day Saints, is slated to go on a two-year mission following the 2002 season and should return for his junior year in 2005.

EXPERIENCED O-LINE: Last year, the primary preseason concern for the Washington football team was inexperience on the offensive line. This year, that would seem to be one of the least of the coaches' concerns. Last year, only senior center Kyle Benn entered the year with any significant game experience. This year, he's the only regular not returning. Four starters — senior Elliott Zajac, juniors Todd Bachert and Nick Newton and sophomore Khalif Barnes — all return to the line (Zajac is currently out of the lineup with a leg fracture, but is likely to return by October). All but Newton started all 12 games last season (Newton started 11). Aside from the four returning starters, the Huskies also have four other offensive linemen returning after having earned a letter last season: junior Jason Simonson and sophomores Aaron Butler (who started once in Newton's place), Ryan Brooks and Dan Dicks. So, in other words, the UW line returned four starters and a startling nine lettermen in 2002.

SAME GOES FOR ILBs: Last year, inside linebackers Ben Mahdavi and Jamaun Willis both started all 12 Husky games. While only Mahdavi, a senior this year, returns, Washington has remarkable depth at the position. Six lettermen, who have a combined 10 varsity letters to their credit, return for the 2002 season. Aside from three-time letterman Mahdavi, there are also juniors Marquis Cooper and Tyler Krambrink (both two-time lettermen; Krambrink also plays OLB) and sophomores Tim Galloway, Matt Lingley and Joe Lobendahn. While Mahdavi is the entrenched starter at one spot, Lobendahn and Cooper have each started this year at the other position.

MAHDAVI PROVES WORTHY: Once a walkon, senior linebacker Ben Mahdavi emerged last year as one of the Huskies' top defensive players. The Mercer Island High product led the 2001 Washington team with 85 total tackles and with five sacks. At the first team meeting of the 2000 season, Husky coach Rick Neuheisel announced that Mahdavi had been awarded a scholarship. Mahdavi made his head coach look good in the season opener against Idaho when he came up with two of the Huskies' biggest plays. Midway through the second quarter he scooped up a fumble and raced 35 yards for a touchdown. Early in the fourth quarter he blocked a Vandal punt that UW recovered on the one-yard line and converted into a touchdown. A backup inside linebacker, Mahdavi also recorded seven tackles, then a career high, in that game. Mahdavi also has the distinction of having scored the first touchdown of the 1999 season as well when he fell on a fumbled punt in the endzone for a TD at Brigham Young in Neuheisel's UW coaching debut. Early in 2000, Mahdavi moved into a starting spot, compiling eight starts in 2000. He started all 11 games plus the Holiday Bowl in 2001 and entered the 2002 season as the Huskies' top defensive player in terms of career starts with 19 (not counting bowls). Mahdavi had originally signed a letter of intent at Utah, but transferred before the 1998 season.

KELLEY'S TRAVELS: A week after the 2001 Rose Bowl victory over Purdue, senior linebacker Anthony Kelley embarked on a trip to South Africa. Kelley, a regular on the defense the last three years and expected to start again in 2002, earned a fellowship to study in South Africa during the winter, 2001 quarter. A former partial academic qualifier, Kelley earned the team's Inspirational Academic Award at the 2000 postseason banquet and graduated last spring. By graduating, Kelley was granted an additional year of eligibility for the 2002 season. Kelley went to South Africa for a second time in early 2002, and upon returning to the United States, raised \$25,000 to bring a troupe of grade-school-aged South African dancers to Seattle for six weeks over the summer. He was honored with the Carlson Leadership Award and also spoke at a ceremony at the UW in which Archbishop Desmond Tutu was rewarded with an honorary doctorate. Last week, Kelley was named to the American Football Coaches Association's All-Good Works Team.

TANK'S TDs: Junior defensive tackle Terry Johnson, who entered the UW in 2000 as a tight end, has put those pass-catching skills to good use as a defensive player. Over a three-game stretch, (last season's Holiday Bowl to this year's second game), Johnson scored two touchdowns on interception returns. In the Holiday Bowl, he picked off a Major Applewhite pass and ran it back 38 yards for a score. Against San Jose State, he intercepted a pass in the endzone for seven points.

ELLIS' EXPLOITS: If only Kai Ellis were allowed to play all of his games against Michigan. The senior linebacker's two career matchups with the Wolverines have yielded the best performances of his Husky career. In this season's opener, Ellis contributed to the UW's defensive effort in just about every way possible, notching a sack, a fumble recovery, an interception, a rush tackle-for-loss, and batting down a pass in Michigan's final series. The sack, fumble recovery and interception were each the first of Ellis' career, while his two pass defenses doubled his career total. In last season's home opener, Ellis tormented the Wolverines to the tune of 13 tackles, including one tackle-for-loss. In between the two games, Ellis appeared in seven contests for Washington, totaling as many as five tackles just twice, and just once notching a tackle-for-loss.

PARADE OF WIDEOUTS: Washington's wide receivers comprise one of the more unique gatherings of prep talent at a single position in recent years. Three Husky wideouts — senior Paul Arnold and sophomores Reggie Williams and Charles Frederick — are former Parade All-Americans, one of the nation's highest prep accolades. Arnold and Williams, meanwhile, were also named to USA Today's first-team All-America squad, while Frederick was a first-team selection by USAToday.com. Arnold earned the honors in 1998 as a tailback at Seattle's Kennedy High School, while Williams and Frederick were each honored as wide receivers following the 2000 season. Williams and Frederick were also touted by at least one publication in 2000 as the top prep wide receiver in the nation. Williams was No. 1 according to Prep Football Report and USAToday.com, while Frederick was the top selection of Student Sports magazine. Incidentally, Frederick also earned honorable mention All-American honors for basketball from USA Today in 1999.

E.T. BREAKS OUT: After spending last year primarily on return teams, sophomore receiver Charles Frederick finally got his chance to break out on offense opening day at Michigan. Frederick, rated as one of the nation's top skill-position players while at Pope John II High in Florida, spent most of last season amongst the NCAA's leaders in punt returns, but never caught a pass. At Michigan, he made five catches for a team-high 88 yards. His 51-yard third-quarter touchdown reception, a spectacular catch between two Wolverines defenders, gave the Huskies their first lead of the game. On Sept. 28 vs. Idaho, "E.T." caught five balls for a team-high 142 yards, and his 74-yard TD catch was the highlight of the day. Frederick also serves as the Huskies' punt and kick returner.

PLAYER NOTES

PACIFIC GROOVE: From All-America center Bern Brostek, to linebacker Ink Aleaga to quarterback Marques Tuiasosopo, the Huskies have had a long tradition of outstanding players of Polynesian descent. The 2002 season is no exception, with 10 Pacific Islanders on the 2002 roster. The list includes five players who prepped in Hawaii — junior Francisco Tipoti (Honolulu, HI/McKinley HS), sophomore Joe Lobendahn (Honolulu, HI/Saint Louis HS), redshirt freshman William Kava (Kaneohe, HI/Iolani HS) and true freshmen Brandon Ala (Waianae, HI/Kamehameha HS) and Donny Mateaki (Honolulu, HI/Iolani HS). The remaining five are sophomores Tui Alailefaleula (Anchorage, AK/Bartlett HS), Junior Coffin (Bremerton, WA/Olympic HS) and Zach Tuiasosopo (Woodinville, WA/Woodinville HS), Manase Hopoi (Sacramento, CA/Valley HS) and redshirt freshman Tusi Sa'au (Seattle, WA/Rainier Beach). The 10 — of which seven are linemen and nine are freshmen or sophomores — are charged with upholding the tradition established by standouts such as Olin Kreutz, Siupeli Malamala, brothers Jeff and Shane Pahukoa, Mac Tuiaea and many others.

WARE LATEST IN TIGHT END TRADITION: Several years ago, when Sports Illustrated ranked the top college programs all-time by position, Washington's tradition of outstanding tight ends was picked No. 1 at that spot. And for good reason — the Huskies' last six regular starters (and one backup) at the tight end position have all gone on to NFL success, dating all the way back to Aaron Pierce. Pierce started the majority of the 1990 and '91 seasons before being drafted by the New York Giants in 1992. Since Pierce, Mark Bruener (Pittsburgh, '95), Ernie Conwell (St. Louis, '96), Cam Cleeland (New Orleans, '98), Jeremy Brigham (Oakland, '98), Reggie Davis (San Diego, '99) and Jerramy Stevens (Seattle, '02) all appeared in the NFL. Five of those seven remain in the NFL today, including four (Stevens, Brigham, Conwell and Bruener) with their original team. Of the group, four were selected in the first or second round, and two (Conwell, Bruener) have started in Super Bowls. This year, senior Kevin Ware will try and keep the streak alive. After notching only eight catches in his first three years total, Ware is off to an impressive start. He's currently ranked second (tied) on the team with 29 receptions (for 316 yards) and his four receiving touchdowns rank second. Ware's four TDs equal the most by a Husky tight end since Rod Jones had five in 1986. His 4.1 receptions per game are third among all tight ends in Division I-A.

POPE JOHN PAUL II PIPELINE: In 2002, the Washington roster includes three players from Pope John Paul II High School, which is located about 3,000 miles from Seattle in Boca Raton, Fla. So far, the remote high school has been very kind to the Huskies. In 1999, kicker John Anderson arrived in Seattle and became a first-team freshman All-American, booting three field goals of 50 or more yards in his first season and establishing himself as probably the best Husky placekicker in a decade or more. In 2000, tailback Rich Alexis first gained notoriety by rushing for a 50-yard touchdown against hometown foe Miami on the seventh carry of his career. Alexis would eventually become the starter and earned first-team freshman All-America after leading the Huskies with 738 yards on 118 carries, an average of 6.3 yards per carry, as well as with nine TDs. Last year, WR Charles Frederick got his chance, primarily as a returner. Frederick came to Washington after earning prep first-team All-America status from several sources and finished 2001 No. 3 in the nation in punt returns.

ANDERSON'S BIG KICKS: When senior kicker John Anderson booted a game-ending, "walk-off" field goal from 32 yards out to win the USC game last season (Oct. 8), it marked the first time in his career that he's won a game with a field goal, no matter how much time was remaining. It also marked the first time since Chuck Nelson kicked a field goal to beat Stanford, 27-24, on Oct. 18, 1980, that the Huskies won a game on the final play. Anderson, however, repeated the feat three weeks later at Arizona State when he kicked a 30-yarder on the final play to beat Arizona State, 33-31.

ANDERSON'S LEG: Washington senior placekicker John Anderson entered his final collegiate season as one of the top candidates for the Lou Groza Award, which he also won as a high school senior. Currently, he ranks fifth in the nation (tied) with 1.71 field goals per game. Against Cal on Oct. 5, Anderson tied a UW single-game record with five field goal attempts, the most by any Husky kicker since Jeff Jaeger was a perfect 5-for-5 against Houston in 1985. Anderson converted four of the five kicks — the second-most field goals made in a game at Washington — including one from 51 yards. Against Arizona, Anderson booted a 52-yarder, the third-longest (tied) in UW history, and the fifth 50+-yard field goal of the senior's career. Anderson's has kicked 12 field goals in seven games in 2002. As a freshman in 1999, Anderson converted 13 of 18 field goals and 34 of 35 PATs that year and led Washington in scoring with 73 points. Anderson's 50-yard field goal against Oregon State that season was the longest by a UW kicker since Jeff Jaeger converted a 52-yard field goal in 1983 vs. Oregon. Since Jaeger's kick, the Huskies had made 224 field goals over the previous 17 seasons without making one from at least 50 yards. Anderson ended that season with three 50-yard field goals to his credit, including a 56-yarder at UCLA to tie the UW school record. That field goal tied as the 14th longest in Pac-10 history, and was the longest by a true freshman in conference history. His kick was the seventh longest in Pac-10 history since 1989, when use of a kicking tee was eliminated. When Anderson booted three 40-plus yard FGs vs. Stanford in 1999, it marked the first time a Husky kicker had converted three 40-yard field goals since Brandy Brownlee made four vs. Texas A&M in 1987. Additionally, as a freshman in 1999, Anderson became only the second true freshman in NCAA history (joining Texas A&M's Tony Franklin) to boot three 50-yard field goals in a single season.

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON: Perhaps the only true freshman that's expected to play this year, at least at this point, is cornerback and return man Nate Robinson. The diminutive (5-foot-9) Seattle native brings a great legacy with him to the UW as his father, Jacque Robinson, was an outstanding tailback for the Huskies in the early 1980s. The elder Robinson still ranks No. 7 on the UW career rushing list (2,300 yards) after finishing his career ranked No. 4. He led the Huskies in rushing in 1982 and 1984 and was a freshman when he was named MVP of the UW's 28-0 win over Iowa in the 1982 Rose Bowl. He capped his career by earning MVP honors in the 1985 Orange Bowl, a 28-17 win over Oklahoma. Nate, who also intends to play basketball at Washington, is the only UW freshman to play this season, starting on kick returns. He's also begun to see regular action as a backup cornerback.

ROSTER CHANGES: Since publication of the 2002 Washington football media guide, there have been numerous changes to the Husky roster. The following scholarship players are no longer on the team: RayShon Dukes, Andre Reeves and Jordan Reffet. The following players have changed positions (new position listed): defensive lineman Stanley Daniels, fullback Ty Eriks, offensive guard Tusi Sa'au, safety Jordan Slye. The following players have changed their uniform number (new number listed): 5 Sam Cunningham, 28 John Gardenhire, 18 Matt Griffith, 6 Eddie Jackson, 88 Clayton Ramsey, 8 Jordan Slye and 5 Scott White. Additionally, sophomore linebacker Joe Lobendahn would prefer to go by the name "Joe" (rather than "Joseph") and has stated that the correct pronunciation of his last name is "LOW-ben-dine".

VOTE FOR STEVE: This fall, CBS Sports will run a television program called "Dell Presents College Football's Ten Greatest Players," and those 10 players will be determined in part by an on-line vote. Former Washington defensive tackle Steve Emtman, who won both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy in 1991, is among 200 candidates on which fans and media can vote. To see the candidates, go to CBS's sportsline.com.

HUSKY HUDDLES: Once again in 2002, the UW will offer its own indoor tailgate party in the Dempsey Indoor Practice Facility before each home football game. Admission is free, though a buffet meal and beverages are also provided for \$22 per person (with three alcoholic beverages), \$17 per person (no alcoholic beverages) and \$12 per child in advance (\$25/\$20/\$15 at the door). The pre-game parties include big-screen television showings of other college football games, the Husky Band and Cheer Squad, the KJR-AM pregame radio show, door prizes, games and special Husky Legend appearances.

FREE STUFF: Several pre- and post-game giveaways are scheduled for home games at Husky Stadium this season. Against UCLA Nov. 2, fans will receive free clappers pre-game and a team poster after. Finally, in the home finale Nov. 9 vs. Oregon State, Husky fans will receive a free set of football trading cards.

FAIL DRIVES: At three UW football games this fall, fans will be asked to bring along a charitable donation. At the Nov. 2 homecoming game vs. UCLA, fans will be asked to bring a blanket for the UW Alumni Association's yearly blanket drive. Finally, the UW Police Department will hold its annual food drive Nov. 9 for the Oregon State game.

RANDOM NOTES: After having opened the season on the road at Michigan, the UW stayed at home for five consecutive games, marking the first time since 1931 that a UW team has played five straight at Husky Stadium in a single season ... in the early part of the last century, it was relatively common for the UW to play much more than half of its games at home and five-game homestands were not rare. However, since the '31 season (the Huskies went 4-1-1 in a six-game home stretch that year), the Huskies have never played more than four in a row at home in any one season ... three times, however, the Huskies have stretched lengthy homestands over two seasons: the UW played its last three of 1969 and the first four of the 1970 season on Montlake and in 1973-74 and 1975-76, the Huskies played six straight home games over two seasons ... last season, Washington led the Pac-10 in attendance for the 11th time in the last 12 seasons, averaging 72,469 fans per game ... not bad, considering that Husky Stadium has a smaller capacity than five of 10 conference schools (ASU, Cal, Stanford, UCLA and USC) ... the 2002 Husky schedule includes a quirk that sees the Dawgs close out the regular season against its three Northwest Pac-10 rivals: Oregon State, Oregon and Washington State (in that order) ... the Huskies haven't played the other three Northwest teams in order (at the end or any other part of the season) since 1914, when Washington's seven-game schedule finished out in the same order as this year's ... the UW also played the three rivals in order in the 1908, 1911 and 1912 seasons ... walkon freshman cornerback Simi Reynolds, who's actually at the UW on a baseball scholarship, will receive a community service award from the Athletes for a Better World organization in a luncheon at Seahawks Stadium on Oct. 29 ... Reynolds, whose older brother Tila is the baseball team's starting shortstop, is being honored for his work mentoring young children with disabilities and for his founding role in Athletes for Kids ... prior to the California contest, Washington had intercepted at least one pass in seven consecutive games, dating back to last season (and counting the Holiday Bowl) ... the last time that the Huskies intercepted a pass in seven straight games was in 1995, when they also went seven straight with at least one pick ... sixth-year senior Patrick Reddick had a career day vs. Cal, setting new personal highs for both receptions (10) and receiving yards (105) ... his 10 catches were the sixth-most ever (tied) in UW single-game history.
